Books for Babies Launches at Middlesex

Read to Grow recently launched our ninth hospital partnership, moving one step closer to our goal of giving every Connecticut newborn a good start on the path to literacy. Middlesex Hospital in Middletown now includes our Books for Babies program as part of their Pregnancy & Birth Center services, and hospital staff has begun giving out Read to Grow's literacy packets to all parents with newborns. The program is funded in part by Middlesex Hospital and will serve approximately 1,100 babies born at the hospital's birthing center annually.

Books for Babies volunteers will begin visiting with parents on the Pregnancy & Birth Center to provide early literacy information and support as soon as they have completed their training, a joint effort between the hospital and Read to Grow staff.

Middlesex Hospital serves 23 towns and 250,000 residents of Middlesex County. Read to Grow is thrilled to bring Books for Babies to Middlesex and to the families served by the hospital.
